
Special Notice for Voting Members!!

The purchase of our Reunion Grounds from Bob Farrar is well underway (see below) and will necessitate an amendment to the Farrar Family Reunion, Inc.'s By-Laws. There will be a hearing and vote on this matter at our Annual Business Meeting, starting at 9:00 a.m. on Father's Day, Sunday, June 15th. No proxy voting provisions for this amendment have been established.

Update: Purchase of Reunion Grounds

In 2007, the Farrar Family Reunion, Inc. (FFR) sought to purchase 10+/- acres of land from Bob Farrar, one of the O-10. The land is part of Bob's 160 wooded acres near Wirth, Arkansas, and have been the site of 28 of our 30 annual Reunions. FFR wanted to ensure that the land it purchased contained all of the permanent structures, Tent City, the gate, and the roadway leading to the campgrounds.

The original survey could not fulfill these requirements, so a resurvey was conducted. After some juggling of boundaries, adding an acre here, dropping an acre there, FFR was able to purchase 12.107 acres with everything on it. Come celebrate our new status as property owners at this year's 31st annual Reunion!! A crude sketch of the final plat map is pasted below. Not to scale.

Patricia Ann (Scott) Garmon, resident of Escondido, California, died 23 August 2007. She was a dedicated genealogical research and teacher; and my mentor in my quest of our Family history. It was during our second Reunion in 1979 at Aunt Jean's place in Texas, when someone broached the idea of a Family Tree. Under pressure, Niece Jill volunteered. That year, 1979-1980, wintering over in Escondido, I partook of Pat's genealogy offerings. She freely shared knowledge and techniques with her attendees; guided field trips to various libraries, including a group flight to the Mormon library in Salt Lake; encouraged membership in a genealogical society; and hosted a graduation party in her lovely home. In the summer of 1980, loaded with new knowledge, Jill and I headed for Farrar County in Flat Creek, Tennessee ... and hit a bonanza! Soon after, encapsulating this new-found information, our now famous Family Tree, extending three generations into England, through Jamestown, to the present was constructed by our very capable brother-in-law Denny Rogers. Its exactness, and included extra historical facts pertaining, reflects his Ph.D.

Pat and I stayed in touch over the years, sharing occasional new information and the inevitable Christmas card. Over those same years, our Reunion has grown productively by hundreds of contacts with extended Family. We have a Family Newsletter with a superb Editor, Kevin. Our Family Tree is so full of helpful information, it sells. With the demise of Miss Alvahn Holmes, author of the two Farrar books, her surviving nephew, Jim Farrior, assigned sole publication and distribution rights to our Reunion. In accord with that agreement, upon his demise, the copyright automatically becomes the property of our Farrar Family Reunion, Inc. This with thanks to my son, Randy, who worked with Jim, and for Randy and Debbie's handling of all new printings and book sales. Our Reunion also erected a Virginia Historical Highway Marker commemorating Farrar's Island.

All considered, our Reunion is a living memorial to the genealogical dedications and passions of Patricia Ann Garmon. She will be long remembered.

3 on 3 Champs are Knockouts

BLOOMINGTON, IL -- Darren Rogers searched for an answer to cure a distaste that kids can get from playing soccer year-round.

"What can you do in the offseason?" he said "You need your downtime — your breaks from full-team soccer — so what to you do?" He found an alternative. Fortunately for him, it was embraced.

Thinking of ways to keep kids competitive and fundamentally sound during the offseason, Rogers started a 3-on-3 soccer team. Nine years later, the unusual tactic has met success as soccer players are reaping the rewards both on and off the field.

"It's a fun thing for the kids to do," Rogers said. "They love it. They don't feel like its work. ... It's just a blast for them and they can have a good time." The teams are successful, too.

Over Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday weekend, an under-16 team (Knockouts) and under-11 team (Knockouts 2) from Bloomington-Normal traveled to Walt Disney's Wide World of Sports complex in Orlando, Fla., to compete in the national tournament. Each team walked away as national champions.

Rogers says the players are reaping the rewards of playing a sport that is beginning to gain mainstream attention. "While they're having a great time, they're improving their skills at a tremendous rate," he said.

Three-on-three soccer is a combination of teamwork, quickness and communication. The field measures 30-by-40-yards with no goalkeeper and a 4-by-8-foot goal. With small dimensions, communication is critical.

"Communication is a huge aspect," said Jenna Wampler, a member of the Knockouts. "The way we defend, it all starts with our back player telling us where we need to be. You always have to communicate with each other."

Speed is also a factor in being successful. "We have to play faster and move the ball around quicker," said Dusti Rogers, who plays for Knockouts 2.

"When we watched them, it looked really fun," Kate Olson. "I guess we just really wanted to do it. We're really committed to it." That is what Rogers envisioned.

"They're not doing it for the skills standpoint right now," he said. "They're just doing it because they like playing it."

Movement is also vital. "We always have to move around," said Knockouts 2 member Courtney Barlow. "You never know what angles somebody's going to come at. When you move the ball

around, you always have to look each way you're at and which way you're going. You always have to be prepared."

The Knockouts, who are comprised of girls who play at Bloomington, Normal Community, Normal West and University high schools, won their second title. With the success of the older group, Rogers says that made the hunger girls hungrier.

"They've set their sights on doing what the older girls have done," he said. "They've put the work in to prepare themselves to be that good. Their confidence is pretty high because they know — and I remind them several times — that they've prepared more than anybody that's down (at nationals)." That helped the Knockouts 2 succeed.

The Knockouts, an Under-16 soccer team is comprised of girls from Bloomington, Normal Community, Normal West and University high schools. They won the 2007 Kick-It World Championships two weekends ago in Orlando, Fla. Team members are Jenna Wampler, Meg Rogers, April Helton, Erin Shulman, Amy Cassiday, assistant coach Dave Wampler, and head coach Darren Rogers.

The Knockouts 2, an Under-II soccer team from Bloomington-Normal also won at the Kick-It World Championships. Team members include assistant coach Jon Olson, Kate Olson, Courtney Barlow, Amber Helton, Marissa Villafuerte, Keely Theobald, Dusti Rogers, and head coach Darren Rogers.

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What You Didn't Know About John Smith

With the kind generosity of correspondent David D. Doughty, maritime Chief Engineer of Spilsby, Lincolnshire, England, dauntless John Smith, first President of Jamestown, looms big.

Born of a dirt farmer in Willoughby, Lincolnshire, the most rural of the shires, baptismal records show 9 January 1580 as the birth date of John. The very same year, Sir Francis Drake sailed home from his around-the-world cruise loaded with gold and jewels confiscated from Spanish galleons for Elizabeth I.

By the time of the defeat of the Spanish Armada, young John, aged eight, is in grammar school in nearby Alford. At 12, he enrolled in the King Edward VI Grammar School in Louth, a market town just north of Alford. Here he attended school in a building on Schoolhouse Lane, a site still used by the school today. John left at 15 and was apprenticed by his father to a merchant, Thomas Sendall, in Norfolk, across the Wash from Lincolnshire.

John, a young teen, reckless and daring, wanted adventure. Upon his father's death, he broke his apprenticeship and volunteered to fight the Spanish in Holland. After a couple of years, he came back to Willoughby and could have returned to tenant farming. Instead, he accepted an offer to act as valet for the sons of Lord Willoughby on their "continental tour", as was the manner of the rich to complete their education.

But John didn't last long as a servant and was returned, encountering a shipwreck in the Farne Islands and an unsuccessful attempt to join the court of King James VI of Scotland along the way.

Home again, now in his late teens, John was loath to be a tenant farmer. Behind the plow he visualized himself a "gentleman", a man of standing, with wealth, rank, and a coat of arms. He abruptly gave up the tilled field and reclused himself camped out in some woods near Willoughby to study leadership and military tactics, while he practiced fighting on horseback as a knight in armor. (Was this an early Thoreau with a little different slant?)

Soon Lord Willoughby learned of this bizarre be-

havior. Or was it concern that John was poaching deer for the pot? At any rate, the kindly old Lord arranged that John be invited to train under the riding master to Lord Clinton, the Earl of Lincoln, whose home was at Tattershall Castle, not far away. In the tilt-yard there, under the expert eye of the master, he learned to fight as a gentleman until both were sufficiently confident he could go off to was again.

So off he went. Not to the lackluster battles of the Low Countries, but to where the real action was—in Southern Europe, being invaded by the Turks. His success there gave him his rank of Captain, a pension for life, and a coat of arms. His arms included three Turks heads, who he had killed in single combat. He was eventually captured, taken to Constantinople, and sold as a slave before escaping and making his way back to London. His next adventure ... Jamestown. But we know the story from there.

Misc information: You can purchase your groceries locally in Mammoth Spring or Thayer.

- <u>Furnished</u>: large ice chest for food storage, ice for drinks (not for private coolers); propane oven; all cooking utensils, bowls & flatware, paper plates & bowls; napkins, salt, pepper, catsup, mustard, sugar, creamer, coffee, tea, toilet paper, paper towels. Regular French, Thousand Island, Ranch, Italian, Honey mustard dressings will be provided by Jill. Or, bring your favorite.
- <u>Breakfasts</u>: Cooked by early risers. Scrambled eggs, bacon, sausage, pancakes, fried potatoes, sliced fruit, toast, butter, jellies/jams, any pastries and/or homemade items brought. Bring what your family would eat of these items for the days you are attending. Not all items will be fixed every day. Example: if pancakes are fixed, we would not fix potatoes. (no syrup needed for 2008)
- Nightly desserts / snacks: Whatever you wish to bring or make.
- <u>Lunch and/or snacks</u>: Whatever you bring for your family. As a general rule, you are on your own. But, feel free to chow down on leftovers from the previous suppers.
- Canoe trip: they usually pack peanut butter & jelly sandwiches, chips, fruit, cookies, water, soda

<u>IMPORTANT</u>: Please bring portions for your family only AND only for the days you are attending. Write your name on stuff you bring. Take it home with you when you leave if it has not been used. This will help eliminate waste at the end of the week. Be sure to put your name on dishes that need to be returned to you after use.

SATURDAY: Beef or pork steak (you cook on the grill)

Baked Potato (we can boil to save time, but if everyone prefers baked on grill, that's fine)

Tossed salad (see above regarding dressings)

SUNDAY: Pork roast

I Box of packaged onion soup mix (i.e.: Lipton's)

Canned cut green beans

Potatoes

Cucumber salad (compliments of Barb)

Jiffy Corn bread mix

MONDAY: Chicken breasts (please pre-cut into strips) NOTE: Jill will supply more Soy Sauce this year!!

Stir fry veggies (prepackaged bag)

Ramen noodles (Jill will supply)

Can or jar of chunky applesauce

TUESDAY: Beef tips and noodles (please pre-cut meat into bite size pieces) NOTE: Jill will supply the noodles

2 cans beef broth

I Box of packaged onion soup mix (i.e.: Lipton's)

Corn on the cob (already shucked and cleaned)

Fruit salad (prepackaged, fresh cut-up, or canned is fine)

From Mammoth Spring, AR. go south on US 63 approximately 4 miles to first left turn lane. See "FARRAR REUNION" sign on the left shoulder. Turn left on Wirth Road and follow the signs.


